## Some fun facts and “Did You Knows” about Texas A&M!

**For those of you who are new to the Aggie world, this page is just for you!**

Texas A&M opened its doors in 1876 as the state's first public institution of higher learning. Today, it stands as a research-intensive flagship university dedicated to sending Aggie leaders out into the world prepared to take on the challenges of tomorrow.

College Station, popularly known as Aggieland or CStat, is about 90 miles northwest of Houston and within a two to three hour drive from Austin and Dallas. Texas A&M's main campus is home to over 59,000 students, and celebrates with more than 436,000 former students worldwide.

The Texas A&M System is one of the largest systems of higher education in the nation and has a budget of \$4.2 billion. Through a statewide network of 11 universities, seven state agencies, two service units and a comprehensive health science center, the A&M System educates more than 140,000 students and makes more than 22 million additional educational contacts through service and outreach programs each year.

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

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## Corps Corner



The Texas A&M University Corps of Cadets (often called The Fightin' Texas Aggie Corps of Cadets, or simply the Corps) is a student military organization established with the University in 1876 and is the oldest student organization on campus. The Corps of Cadets develops well-educated leaders of character who embody the values of HONOR, COURAGE, INTEGRITY, DISCIPLINE and SELFLESS SERVICE. They are academically successful, highly sought-after, and prepared for the global leadership challenges of the future. Approximately 42 percent of the members of the Corps receive a commission in the United States Armed Forces upon graduation. Under federal law, Texas A&M University is one of six U.S. colleges that are classified as senior military colleges. Though students at Texas A&M are “technically” required to participate in the Corps, the majority of incoming students are excused by the University Administration and the Commandant. Those who elect to join the Corps must participate in mandatory Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) courses and training for the first two years, but these are optional for junior and senior year cadets.
